Welcome to the twenty-second issue of *Flash*, a bumper catch-up compendium of sixty-five new stories from fifteen countries: Argentina, Australia, Canada, Germany, India, Ireland, Italy, New Zealand, Pakistan, Poland, Portugal, Romania, Singapore, the UK, and the USA. We are pleased to feature some stellar serial contributors and many fresh voices, including Lucy McDougall whose 'A Bump in the Road' is a past winner of the UK's National Flash Fiction Youth Competition.

In this issue's 'Flash Reviews', we survey a range of books: two single-author collections, two novellas-in-flash, a multi-author anthology, and a craft guide. Liz Milne considers quirky compaction in Meg Pokrass's The Dog Seated Next to Me, while Brian Baker contemplates the influence of a pop-culture icon in F. J. Morris's This Is (Not About) David Bowie. Novellas-in-flash are enjoyed by Santino Prinzi, who appraises Nod Ghosh's The Crazed Wind, and Christine Simon, who assesses Michael Loveday's Three Men on the Edge. Peter Blair is captivated by a wide-ranging selection of bijou tales, Bonsai: Best Small Stories from Aotearoa New Zealand, edited by Michelle Elvy, Frankie McMillan, and James Norcliffe. Ashley Chantler finds Fred D. White's Writing Flash: How to Craft and Publish Flash Fiction for a Booming Market idiosyncratic but worth every cent.

This issue is dedicated to the memory of our colleague Professor Derek Alsop: Head of English, Restoration and eighteenth-century literature specialist, Beckett scholar, enthusiastic supporter of *Flash*, and a man of big heart and lively humour. It opens with the posthumous, first publication of his story 'Hice'.
